We present our personal giving commitments for a new year of serving God as followers of Jesus Christ.

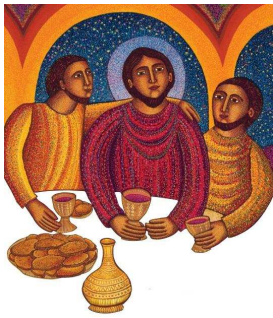
Watch for more information as we begin this exciting time of growth and giving together!

World Communion Sunday: October 2

“Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.” -Matthew 5:9



On World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday in October (October 2), we will receive the Peacemaking Offering to support the efforts of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to live out a deeper commitment to peacemaking as part of our faithfulness to God. Western Boulevard Presbyterian Church will keep 25% of the offering to support AventWest Children's Mentoring, which provides individualized homework support for neighborhood students living in homes where homework support is not feasible as well as a nutritious snack or meal for children whose families struggle to provide a nutritious diet. Another 25% will be used by the Presbytery of New Hope for its Peacemaking Program and the remaining 50% will go to the General Assembly to support the International Peacemakers Program, which brings Christian peacemakers from around the world here to tell Presbyterians in the USA about peacemaking ministries in their countries, and the Peacemaking Program's travel/study seminars, which take Presbyterians to other countries to learn about peace and justice issues from mission co-workers and church partner leaders.

Update on Three Year Capital Campaign (2009 - 2011)

We are nearing the end of our Capital Campaign which was instigated in late 2008 for a three year period ending in 2011 and what a success we have had meeting our obligations. THANK YOU. THANK YOU. THANK YOU. Your pledge period is nearing an end and we would ask you to fulfill your obligations if you have not already done so. The pledged amount was \$328,000 and we have received to date at August 31, 2011 \$282,000. We had borrowed \$216,000 and have paid back as of August 31, 2011 some \$176,000. Our goal was to pay back the total amount borrowed over a three (3) year period and we are almost there thanks to your continued effort to meet obligations. At this time, we are short \$46,000 in pledges and owe \$40,000 on our loan obligation. Let's make this a completed campaign by paying off our loan in 3 years and fulfilling our obligations. Thank you again for your commitment to this campaign.

“Who Eats and Who Starves?”

What is going on in Congress and what are people of faith to do?

Join your Mission Outreach Committee on **Sunday, October 2** in the fellowship hall after morning worship for education, reflection, advocacy and a light lunch as we raise our voices on behalf of the poor and vulnerable people in our nation and around our world.

Congress has a Super Committee making recommendations about our budget. Why does this matter to people of faith—and to members at Western Boulevard Presbyterian Church? This matters because budgets are moral documents—our budget determines, in the words of The Rev Dr. James Forbes, “Who Eats and Who Starves”. As Christians who care about our neighbors, as Christians who worship a God who brings good news to the poor, we cannot allow our representatives to balance a budget on the backs of poor and vulnerable folks because, **WE CARE ABOUT STARVING PEOPLE—OUR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST.**

On September 14, 2011, the News and Observer reports “Poverty hits record high.” Tony Hall from the Alliance to End Hunger visited East Africa and on August 10, 2011 sends the question—“Why is America Cutting Emergency Food Aid in the Middle of a Famine?” Can Christians sit silently by in complicit acceptance of this situation? Or should we, as Jesus commands “love our neighbor as ourselves” and raise our voices? What if you were the starving person or what if your child or grandchild was starving?

Funding of Phase 1 of Long Range Plan

As most of you heard after attending one of the two presentations on Sunday, September 18th, 2011, concerning WBPC's Long Range Planning, we are on a go-ahead mission to fund the \$100,000 Phase I renovation/update of the Fellowship Hall. The plan is to have current contributors to the Three Year Capital Campaign extend their pledge amount by 1/3 of the original pledge over another year or two. Those members who did not contribute to the original campaign are asked to make a pledge to the Phase I project. The Stewardship Package for 2012 will have a separate pledge card concerning the Phase I project. The Phase I projects will be done as the monies are generated through pledges and any excess will apply to Phases II and III.

How Christians Make Ethical Decisions

October Wednesday Night Live Series:

One cannot talk about the Christian ethic because there is no unanimity among Christians on moral judgments. Christians differ on such individual questions as whether honesty is an absolute requirement and on such broad social issues as what to do about illegal immigration. There is no one Christian position on war, human sexuality, health care, or any other moral issue. One reason for this lack of unanimity is the differences among Christians on the starting point. What makes something good or bad, right or wrong? On what basis do we choose our values? What procedure do we follow in deciding what to do?

Some Christians focus on an external authority by which right and wrong, good and bad are defined. Some emphasize the necessity of individual decision-making and the process by which that is done. And some stress cooperative action on the broad social problems. These concerns are not mutually exclusive, and indeed most Christians pay some attention to all three. Yet for each person one emphasis usually emerges as basic to the other two. We shall try to understand the alternative approaches in order both to make good decisions for ourselves and to engage in fruitful conversation with people whose judgment is different from ours.

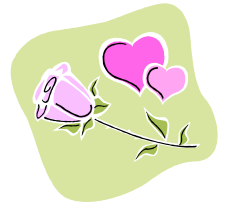
Coping with Grief and Loss:

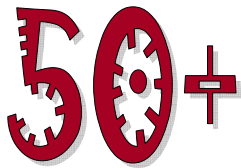
